How Learning Works: Seven Research-Based Principles for Smart Teaching

Michele DiPietro, Executive Director, Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning and Associate Professor, Mathematics and Statistics, Kennesaw State University

A tenet of learner-centered teaching is that learning is the litmus test of any pedagogy. Therefore, one of the most important investments professors can make is to understand the learning process so that their teaching is intentionally designed to maximize learning. In this workshop, Michele DiPietro will synthesize 50 years of research on learning from the cognitive, metacognitive, motivational, developmental, and inclusive-learning perspectives into seven integrated principles. This interactive workshop will illustrate the seven principles with demonstrations, discussions, and other activities that highlight how each of the principles can be used to enhance participants' teaching. Michele DiPietro is a co-author of the new and highly regarded book on college teaching: How Learning Works: Seven Research-Based Principles for Smart Teaching. He is also the President of the Professional and Organizational Development (POD) Network in Higher Education, the leading association of faculty developers in North America.

Finding and landing a professional position is more than simply completing a degree or completing a postdoc, internship, or temporary job. It is a complex process that varies by discipline and requires development of and confidence in your abilities, an aptitude to effectively network within and across disciplinary fields, and the capacity to analyze your skills, knowledge, and strengths.

In this workshop students will be exposed to the essential competencies sought by employers of Ph.D.'s as identified in Plan Your Work, Work Your Plan: Essential Career Competencies for Ph.D.s (MSU Graduate School Publication). Students will also assess themselves on the six essential career competencies and begin making their own individualized career and professional development plan. Overall this workshop is designed to help you:

- Recognize the skills you are acquiring that complement and go beyond your disciplinary specialization
- Understand the broad uses of those skills during graduate school, the postdoc experience, and your future career
